
picture. If there are other Alumni members who have achieved significant milestones in their lives and who you think should be high-lighted in the Newsletter, please let us know.

Message from the Grey Nuns in Saskatoon

The cohort of young women who faced the challenges and newness more than 100 years ago, as the first graduating class of St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing, did so hand in hand with the Grey Nuns.

Presently there are two Grey Nuns; Sr. Josephine Bouvier and myself, Sr. Carol Borreson, living in Saskatoon. We are renting a suite in the new Columbian Place which is operated by the Knights of Columbus Charities. Our home is just two blocks from St. Paul's Hospital.

Sr. Josephine works as an educational assistant at St. Mary's Community School where she brings a wonderful presence to the students, staff and families. Sr. Josie, as she is known by the children, is herself of Cree Metis heritage. That is **one** of the wonderful gifts she shares with St. Mary's community. More than once I have seen the magic that happens when a pair of little brown eyes look up at Sr. Josie and see Sr. Josie looking back.

A decade or more ago, I worked as a staff nurse and then Director of Mission at St. Paul's Hospital. I had the privilege to witness what defined the spirit of the St. Paul's grads. Today I work as a parish nurse with St. Mary's and St. John Bosco parishes. It has been a wonderful opportunity to know the importance of that same spirit within the context of the parish and the community. Message from the President & CEO, St. Paul's Hospital



St. Paul's Hospital

Welcome to 2014! The past year has seen continued growth at St. Paul's. We now complete as many as 55 surgeries each day and provide care for up to 272 inpatients each day. Our outpatient clinics are also scheduled to capacity each day. We are very proud of our staff and physicians, who have worked very hard

to reduce the surgical wait lists. By November of 2014 we expect that every patient who is waiting for surgery will have been offered a surgical date that is within 3 months of the time we learn they need surgery.

This increase in service is of great benefit to our patients, but does bring many challenges. We receive concerns about the cleanliness of our building and we take those concerns seriously. A Director was appointed last fall and he has established a system to audit the cleanliness of our worksites. The management team is working in a different way, spending the majority of their time out working directly with staff in their work areas, ensuring we are coordinating housekeeping work well with the flow of our patients and meeting our standards.

A second challenge is parking capacity. To meet this need our Board purchased land and constructed an additional parking lot at the corner of 20th Street and Avenue R. Parking Services is working to determine who will have access to this lot.

The Transplant Program celebrated its 50th anniversary in October with moving presentations from a man who had a kidney transplant, a young man waiting for a transplant and a woman who joined the living donor registry and was matched with and traveled to a patient from another province, where one of her kidneys was transplanted. We had a large crowd in the cafeteria to take part in this event. Dr. Richard Baltzan spoke on behalf of the program.

We are excited about a number of projects underway that will assist us to meet our growing capacity. Dr. George and Ms. Shelda Pylypchuk have sponsored a renovation to our Auditorium which will open in March. This upgrade will provide a fully integrated audio visual system, including Telehealth capability. We expect it to be in high demand for staff, student and public sessions. The need to replace the electron microscope at the Royal University Hospital has allowed us to relocate it to St. Paul's, where it is heavily used to support the Transplant Program.

2014 will continue to bring many challenges and I look forward to sharing those with you next year!

Newsletter

Last year we adopted a new format which included a new header featuring our Graduation pin and the use of an updated script in our School colors. The color format was used throughout the publication. That was the advice that Edna Pepper received from her father.

She was just 16 years old when her father became ill and since her mother found it difficult to care for him, Edna took on the responsibility of nursing him back to health, which she did. From then on, she wanted to become a trained nurse.

Edna was born in 1910 into a family of 3 boys and 2 girls. She grew up in Deer Creek, SK (near Paradise Hill). In such a small farming community she was only able to take up to grade 9. In order to complete her schooling, it was necessary for her to go to a boarding school in Saskatoon, and then into nurses training.

It was the depression. There was no money for any extras. She doesn't know how her parents afforded to send her. She remembers going by train from Deer Creek to Battleford and then on to Saskatoon. Once there, she didn't go home. Her dad wrote letters, but she was very lonesome. "If tears were pennies, we would have all been millionaires!"The nursing students were all in the same situation and they made their own fun. She remembers an incident that happened late one night after the sisters had made their last rounds. There was an annex behind the hospital that housed the men's ward. Behind this was the hospital garden. Someone made a dare to go out and pick some of the luscious cucumbers from the garden. So, they dressed in the men's dark robes, went down the fire escapes out into the garden, and brought back the coveted cucumbers. "Those were the best cucumber sandwiches I ever had!"

Edna remembers the nurse's residence as being a very old building. "There were twelve of us to a room and lots of mice!" It was wonderful when the new hospital and residence (fall 1931) were built. Then each student had her own room. The stipend was \$7.00 per month and some of that money went for books. There were

twelve subjects and the classes were held in the hospital. They had two hours off each day. They started practical nursing on the wards right away. The hospital was short of paid staff during the depression years and depended on the students to carry the load. Edna said their training was hard and very strict but she felt that they received an excellent nursing experience. This was so helpful as the grads went back to many remote rural areas



and needed to take charge of the situations in which they found themselves. Edna graduated with her nursing diploma in 1933. Unfortunately, her mother had just broken her arm. After being away from home for three years, Edna was happy to go home and look after the family.

In 1934, Edna started her first job in Loon Lake, SK. The hospital, a log building of seven rooms, was run by the Red Cross. The starting wage was \$10.00 per month and by 1936, it increased to \$40.00 per month. She describes the place as being very primitive - no electricity and no indoor plumbing. They would empty the bedpans in big pails and then these pails were emptied outside. Often the people, who would come to work at the hospital to pay off their hospital debt, did some of these chores. They would also bring meat and produce to the hospital or wood and coal. There was also an icehouse that needed to be kept stocked. The actual staff consisted of a matron and one nurse. They both lived right at the hospital. The matron worked the day shift and Edna worked the night shift. They took turns using the same bedroom and the same bed! There was a doctor who lived nearby. When he was needed, one would have to run over to his home to get him. Many times, he would wait until the last minute to operate. His wife or the matron would give the anesthetic. It was unlikely that either of them had any formal training in anesthetics. Edna remembers patching gloves for the OR. To make them last longer, they would be worn inside out so the patches would stay on. The sterilizer was a pressure cooker. There were no IV's. Instead they gave interstitials.

Edna later worked at Pierceland, at a nursing station, then in Paradise Hill and then in Goodsoil. During and after the war there seldom was a doctor in these places and few nurses. Penicillin had just been discovered but as it was so new, she was almost afraid to give it. There was so much responsibility whether in a hospital or even at home. Edna describes an incident that happened after she was married and living on the farm. Their hired man was away when his young wife, who was 7 months pregnant, went into labor. Edna assisted with the delivery of the tiny premature baby, put it in a shoebox with a hot water bottle on the oven door and took it to the mother every 2 hours to feed – all that while looking after the other little children. Many other times she was called on to examine rashes, diagnose a stroke or give advice on various other health concerns.

What incredible changes Edna has witnessed in medicine and in nursing in the 80 years since she received her diploma from St. Paul's School of Nursing.

She remains very interested in her chosen profession and loves to share all her special memories of a rewarding career.

the singing of the St. Paut's Hos-- pital school song.




